DRFC History

The Downingtown Rugby Football Club was founded in 1996 by Mike Drill, a teacher within the Downingtown Area School District. The team was established on the principal that strength through unity produces results. In addition to developing the teamwork skills of young women and men over the past 20 years, DRFC has also achieved several state titles and participated in national championship tournament play. Off the field players are encouraged to participate in local community service activities as individuals, or as part of a DRFC club effort.

DRFC is dedicated to promoting positive athletic and sportsmanship skill growth of competitive rugby playing. All girls and boys within the Downingtown and surrounding area school districts are eligible and welcome to play for the club teams. We welcome all athletes interested in the sport regardless of prior experience. New members quickly find that rugby is a fast paced and team oriented sport, with a greater emphasis on agility and smart organized team play, versus muscular brawn.

We promote an early introduction to rugby with our summertime non-contact Rookie Rugby Camp, which is open to all children ages 5 to 12. The summer Rookie Rugby Camp introduces players to the game of rugby, teamwork and team sportsmanship. Many of our Rookie Rugby participants go on to play rugby for the DRFC or other local rugby clubs.

DRFC competes at the Division 1 Club Team level in the state wide rugby union managed by Rugby Pennsylvania. The club also participates in a Mid-Atlantic premiere league which provides high level competition against nationally ranked clubs from New York and Canada to Virginia.

The club is managed by an elected Board of Directors and is supported by a volunteer Parents Association. DRFC operates as a non-profit 501c3 organization. Our funding is solely dependent on player dues and contributions from sponsor supporters.

Club Details

School affiliations

The club draws players primarily from the Downingtown Area School District. In the interest of providing playing opportunities to other students in areas without a program, the club has opened membership to local players from other districts (Coatesville, Twin Valley, Great Valley).

Teams

The club operates four boys and girls teams.

U15 Boys – draws male players from grades 8 and 9 (15's season only)

U19 Boys – draws male players from grades 10, 11 and 12 (15's and 7's seasons)

U19 Girls – draws female players from grades 7 through 12 (15's and 7's seasons

U13 Co-Ed – draws male and female players from grades 5, 6 and 7 (15's season only)

Rookie Rugby – Summer program for all elementary school grade levels

Competition

The club fields teams in conjunction with the RugbyPA coordinated Fall 7's and Spring 15's seasons. The U19 Boys team also participates in a Mid-Atlantic premier league which coordinates matches among elite teams in Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia and allows access to top-tier regional tournaments.

Club activities

The club organizes an annual foreign travel tours for competitive matches against international club teams and cultural and rugby related activities. The tour trip generally occurs during the Easter spring break in April. Recent club trips have been to Wales, Scotland, Ireland.

- The U19 Boys travel in odd numbered years; 2019, 2021, etc
- The U19 Girls travel in even numbered years; 2020, 2022, etc.

The club offers a book scholarship award at the end of each season for graduating seniors. The award is granted to a male and female player who submit the selected essay on "What rugby means to me."

The club participates in the annual Downingtown Christmas Day parade, and collect food donations on the parade route that are donated The Lords Pantry in Downingtown.

Fundraising

The primary fundraiser event for the club our annual Beef and Beer event taking place in May. The club also pursues sponsorships of varying levels for direct support of club expenses; field rental, uniforms, equipment and other overhead costs.

The club collects annual membership dues from players which also contribute to support of club operations including insurance fees, tournament entry fees and other overhead costs.
